Paths to science

Die Junge Akademie is releasing the children's book "Young Scientists" together with the Carl Hanser publishing house

Together with the Carl Hanser publishing house, *Die Junge Akademie* is releasing the children's book "Young Scientists" (German language only). The release date is 15 May 2023. The book is targeted toward children and young people age 12 and over. The goal is to spark the readers' interest in science, to demonstrate paths into science, and to inspire them to pave their own way.

Nobody is born a researcher. But what are the actual paths (and detours) to a career in science and what questions can be posed in research? In the book "Young Scientists", 30 researchers from a variety of disciplines share their first encounters and influential experiences in science. They talk about coincidences and decisions, errors and moments of discovery, and about what questions they are still trying to answer. Their stories show how an outsider in kindergarten can become a professor of information technology. They explain why a daughter of an illiterate mother decided to teach Islamic theology. Or why a legal scholar simply wants to know why rules are so important for our coexistence. 30 engaging life stories from scientists in the humanities, social sciences, natural sciences, and engineering that can spark a young person's interest in science. Most of the people profiled are current or former members of *Die Junge Akademie* and are representative of the *Akademie*'s diversity.

Miriam Holzapfel, a cultural scientist, independent editor, and author, embarked on a journey through various scientific fields, spoke with researchers, and created their profiles. The illustrations are by Alexandra Rusitschka, Marion Blomeyer, Eva Hillreiner, Miriam Bröckel, and Beppo Albrecht.

"The paths leading to a career in science are as varied and diverse as the researchers and the research questions themselves. That is what we want to show children and young people with this book and the people featured in it. At the same time, we want to encourage them to pursue their curiosity and questions and maybe even pave their own way into science," explains physicist Astrid Eichhorn, a member of *Die Junge Akademie* and a co-initiator of the publication.


